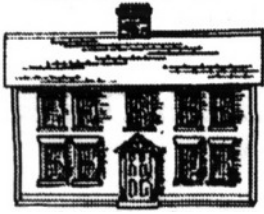

President's letter

Hello Everyone,

If you helped yourself to the box of seeds from the URI Master Gardener Program at the Pot Luck

supper last month, are you thinking that Spring can't be far off? (Jeff Faria will have more seeds for us at this April meeting also.) A tasty supper was enjoyed by all. Our great thanks to all the fine cooks in this group and to Peter Allen, Pat Henry, Kris Rose and others who did set-up/clean-up. Many of us would like that recipe for tapioca pudding.

And thanks go to the "in house" group of panel members who took us through the evolution of the proposed Phillipsdale Historic Mill Village District. Dave Kelleher talked about the birth of the concept of a Roger Williams Avenue Historic District in the Historic Properties Commission culminating in the present Historic District Commission decision to concentrate on the high quality and variety of buildings built by companies near Phillipsdale Landing. His

original slides from 2003 complimented Edna Anness's pictorial tour of the amazing variety of mill housing to be found in the proposed District. With Dot Thornley's photos and Reinhard Wohlgemuth's wizardry at power point presentation, we had a very classy, informative walk around the neighborhood. And then, bringing the subject home for us all, Maggie Dooley described her family's years at 40 Ruth Avenue in mill housing which they bought from the American Electrical Works for \$10.00 in 1927. These three, plus member Stephen Greenleaf, an architect who has appeared before Historic District Commissions, answered questions from the group and we heard some great anecdotes from people who know the area well.

While researching the topic of "RI Mill Villages", I was astonished to learn that communities in Alabama, NH and N. Carolina all prefaced their mill village applications with, "our proposed district is in the style of a RI mill village," leading one to believe that we have something quite special here in

RI. Indeed, I found that 22 communities boast of 32 districts. East Providence itself has two, hopefully soon to be three. Please watch for news from City Hall about public discussions to be held at Grace Church (in the District).

We will of course alert you if we can, but our Gazette deadlines mean we sometimes miss posting in time. Please share knowledge about the proposed District with your friends and neighbors and encourage them to support it.

As for the fish ladder: it appears that the rebar is in place for the pouring of the ladder up through the foundation. Progress is being made! I hope to see you all at the April meeting. Please check inside for the details.

One Year By-Law Amendment

At the March meeting, your president erred in being too quick to ask for a vote concerning the motion to set aside for one year the by-law determining the number of terms a president can serve. As presently set, these terms are for one year each and no president can serve more than two consecutive terms. This current president is at the end of her second term so would need to leave the office. However, with the situation at Hunt House and the need for continued meetings with City, State and Federal officials, the Board thought it wise to keep the same person at the helm until the fish ladder work is finished. The by-laws state that a motion concerning a change of a by-law must be made at one meeting, posted in the Gazette, and voted upon at the next meeting.

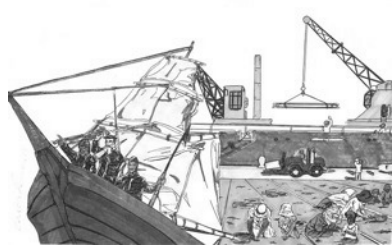
Therefore, at the members meeting, March 28th, Peter Allen made a motion that:

The present by-law concerning the term limit for the office of president shall be set aside for one year only to allow the serving president to continue as the group's representative in all matters concerning the fish ladder work.

Seconded by Robert Tewksbury.

NOTE: None of the other present officers would be required to continue their terms unless they wish to do so. At this point, nearly all of the Board has agreed to continue to serve. What a great bunch of people.

Gardening Tips

Jeff Faria, Master Gardener and EPHS member, will share secrets of composting and soil testing. Besides the digging going on for the fish ladder, Jeff and a group of gardening volunteers will be doing some of their own digging as they tend the gardens at the Hunt House. Jeff will give us an overview of planting plans and how our gardens are growing.

- Fertilize asparagus beds with a granular fertilizer or aged compost.
- Dig clumps of crocus, snow drops, daffodils and tulips while they are still green, after flowering to replant around the yard.
- Transplant trees and shrubs before they show signs of new growth. Plant trees at the flair of the roots, where it meets the trunk, not too deep for best chance of long life.
- Have your soil tested! I will be testing soil samples at the next member meeting. Bring a sample from your yard, garden or problem area. Collect a tablespoon each from a few spots in a particular area. Collect the sample from an inch or two below the surface. I will test and reveal your ph level, which will help you get better results! See you April 25th!
